Dear Parents/Carers and families

As the Christmas Holiday approaches and 2016 comes to an end, we reflect on what has been an exciting but long term at Belmont. Our new staff are settling in well and students have worked exceedingly hard over the past 15 weeks. The science block renovation and extended dining facilities are nearing completion and the students can't wait to start using them for experiments and lunching (in that order!).

This term saw our Section 5 OFSTED inspection; the report can be found via the school website. The inspection reinforced our own assessment of the school and strengthens our resolve to drive through the necessary improvements for the benefit of all of our students.

As well as the usual parents' evenings, we offered all parents/carers the opportunity to attend a 'Raising Achievement Evening' to look at assessments and help you support your children through revision, be it for GCSE or KS3. We continue to try and engage with parents and take on good ideas. If you would like to share your thoughts, then we hold a termly Parents' Forum, details of which can be found on the website. This year Ms Burton has introduced a weekly school text so that we can link you to the website and all the key information therein. Texts are sent out on a Friday so please make sure we have your correct mobile number so that you receive the latest information. We have a school app currently in development and will launch it in the new year, so that you can find out what is happening at the press of a button.

This year we are promoting oracy as a key skill and Belmont students took part in our first debating contest at Durham High School. We believe strong oral skills are vital to a successful career and we are developing opportunities for students to gain experience speaking in public. Those who attended the Remembrance Service and saw our scratch choir perform the newly written Belmont Anthem or were lucky enough to get a seat at this year's pantomime Aladdin will testify to the talent our students possess. This year our new Head of Music, Mrs Summers, has organised a traditional carol service with students performing carols and lessons in St Mary's church. I hope you enjoy reading more about all the students have been doing and the many other successes they have achieved so far this year.

Our new rewards system has been successful with students gaining thousands of merits. We now have a special reward called Hot Chocolate Friday where a special group of students enjoy a treat for their hard work, you can see who has received this award by following our Twitter feed.

### The Brilliant Club

A group of year 8 pupils were selected to take part in the Scholars Programme run by The Brilliant Club. The Scholars Programme is designed to give pupils exposure to a genuine academic environment and to experience learning in the style of a university student.

Together with Mrs Cooper the group spent the day at Durham University where they found out more about life at university. The pupils have been working with their PhD Tutor Reeta Humalajoki in a series of small group university-style tutorials. During the tutorials pupils have been completing readings and assignments that stretch them to work at level above their current key stage.

The topic they have been exploring is The French Revolution and students have had to submit a final 1,500 word university style assignment answering the question 'Why was there a French Revolution?' They were asked to consider the different interpretations of this major event in History by historians as well as using primary sources to help them make their own judgements. They will find out their results next term.

With a cast of over 60 students, a lot of effort and energy was put in to make it a really great Christmas panto. As well as the performers on the stage a team of students worked as part of the backstage team, designing scenery and make up and operating the lights and sound. Performing Arts Teacher, Jane Cooper, who wrote and directed the show said, "The students learn a great deal whilst also enjoying themselves. They have to work as a team, create and refine their performances and develop confidence."



## Future Business Magnates

### Year 11 Laing Gallery Visit

Year 11 students visited the Alice and Wonderland Exhibition at the Laing Gallery Newcastle. The exhibition Explores the different ways generations of illustrators, artists, musicians, filmmakers and designers over the past 150 years have been inspired by the story of the girl who went 'down the rabbit hole'. Students were able to see a variety of work celebrating *Alice in Wonderland* by Mervyn Peake, Ralph Steadman, Leonard Weisgard, Arthur Rackham, Peter Blake and Salvador Dali.

Our students were given a tour of the exhibition, they made studies and explored the exhibition. We then worked with the Gallery Education team creating work inspired by the Exhibition. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience, especially being able to go into rooms and corridors not usually open to the public. The trip was planned to at the beginning of their Wonderland project, they have gone on to have created their own exciting and original personal response to the theme Wonderland as part of their GCSE course work.



### Belmont Anthem

As part of a World War 1 project three Belmont County Councillors commissioned a Belmont Anthem, written by a local composer Andy Jackson. On Sunday 13th November 2016 there was a service of Remembrance held at St Mary Magdalene Church, Belmont. It was during the service that the newly established Belmont Community School girls choir performed the piece; also the first time the girls choir had performed in public.

### Duke of Edinburgh

2016 has seen 13 students qualify for their Bronze Level Award. There are a further 15 students who have completed three sections, Skill, Physical and Volunteering. We hope to be able to offer them an opportunity to complete the full award in the spring although GCSEs have to be their priority.

Looking forward we have 30 students signed up for the Bronze award , many of whom are already well through three sections. Several of this years qualifiers are looking forward to starting their Silver Award.



### **Science Lab Refurbishment**

Our Science block has undergone a huge refurbishment this term. The project has cost half a million pounds which has been funded by the Local Authority. We are hoping that students and staff will be settled back into the new classrooms fully by our return to school in January.



### **Our PSHE & SRE Programme in Years 7-10**

We believe that promoting the health and well-being of our pupils is an important part of their overall education. We do this through our Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) course. This looks at many topics including all kinds of relationships, physical / emotional health and living in the wider world. The aim of the PSHE course is to help our pupils make safe and informed decisions during their school years and beyond.

Sex and Relationship Education (SRE) is an important part of the PSHE course. We will be teaching lessons about SRE in the Spring term which will include topics such as (puberty; relationships and communication skills; prevention of sexual abuse; body image; sexting and social media; pornography; consent).

During the course, pupils will be able to ask questions, which will be answered factually and in an age appropriate manner. Each pupil's privacy will be respected, and no one will be asked to reveal personal information.

Some parts of SRE are compulsory - these are part of the National Curriculum for Science. Parents can withdraw their children from all other parts of SRE if they wish to do so. However, we believe that the presentation of sexual images in social and other media make it important that all young people have a place to discuss pressures, check facts and dispel myths.

### **Football News**

Our Year 7 footballers have made an excellent start to the season, winning many of their games and showing great commitment and teamwork. The team have recently qualified for the County 5 a side final which is in January. Special mention to Year 8 Joseph Wharrior who attended district trials and made it through to the final trails.

Our other football teams have made inconsistent starts to the season.

Training for the boys football takes place on a Wednesday, girls on a Tuesday, 2:30—3:30pm.

## **Design and Technology has a facelift**

The autumn term has been a busy time in the Design Technology and Alternative Curriculum area.

September saw the launch of the brand new GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition course with a group of Year 9 students while another group of Year 9 students embarked on their WJEC Constructing the Built Environment course.

Our year 11 students are making excellent progress with their Controlled Assessment work in Food, Electronic Products and Resistant Materials Technology courses and in their final year of their Construction course too.

The biggest changes to the department can be seen in our workshop area.

The acquisition of some new equipment along with the repositioning of some existing machines and the construction of a dividing wall between the workshop and adjacent classroom have transformed the learning environment.

The workshop boasts a new non-slip safety floor along with enhanced dust extraction on the machines while the classroom area has been transformed.

A new carpet, repaint, new benching, additional electrical sockets and 4 new computers have created a bespoke classroom for design development and CAD/CAM.

The Year 11 students are already benefitting from this improved ICT access as they develop their Electronic Products and Resistant Materials projects and we look forward to even more investment opportunities in the future.



## **Extra Dining Room**

As a result of parental consultation surrounding our dining facilities we approached the Local Authority to help create an extension to our current dining hall.

Our extension is nearly complete and looking great so far!



## Sports at Belmont

Basketball has been running after school this half term on a Wednesday. The students who have attended have had the opportunity to further develop their physical, cognitive and social skills in basketball and have enjoyed the competition against other students. We will be looking to arrange basketball fixtures against other schools next term. Finally, a special mention to Azuolas, Kasparus and Kristipus Grinius who are all currently playing for Durham Wildcats development squads.

Due to the huge popularity of the Infinite Air Club we will be extending this to Tuesday night as well as Thursday. There is a fee of £5 for this activity which includes transport to Infinite Air when available and 1 hour of trampolining. Students will need to collect a letter to attend this club and pay before the session. This club runs from 2.30-4pm.

Every Monday from 2.30-5.00pm table tennis coach Paul Henderson runs coaching for students interested in developing their skills in this sport. Players are welcome from all year groups and no experience is needed. Students who have attended the club have gone onto play at club standard and represent the school. Brand new equipment has been purchased to support the club including table tennis bats, ball and an electronic serving machine.

The PE department is delighted to be accredited as an assessment centre for Sports Leaders UK and have registered students on both the Level 1 Award in Sports Leadership, Level 2 Award in Sports Leadership and the Level 2 Award in Community Sports Leadership. Students will need to plan and deliver a sports session to a group of students and complete 10 hours of voluntary sports coaching. Any student who would like to take part in this awards programme need to attend after school on a Tuesday from 2.30-3.30pm in room 17. There is no cost to students to complete the qualification and at the end of the course students will gain a Nationally recognised qualification. Students will also gain vital leadership skills and be given opportunities to gain additional sports specific coaching awards.

The year 10 sports leaders did a fantastic job leading the Primary School Sports Hall Athletics competition on Friday 4th November 2016. Over 100 primary school children attended the event and the leaders had to demonstrate the activities and officiate the different events. Jennifer Lloyd Edwards the competition manager for the School Partnership said the leaders were a credit to the school.
